**for the Year Ended 31 January 2026**

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 January 2026.

The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES** **OBJECTIVES**

The objectives of the Association are to promote and advance international development as a field of study, research and action, with a mission to deepen understanding of how global poverty and inequalities are produced, sustained and may be overcome, and how a better future may be advanced.

#### **VISION**

In taking forward its mission and vision, the DSA is committed to:

1. Advance connections between people that will extend and deepen understanding of development issues
2. Raising the profile of the UK development studies community and provide a platform for its collective voice
3. Build the institutional strength of the DSA
4. Nurturing the future of development studies in the UK through support to students, early career researchers and Higher Education teachers
5. Promote greater inclusiveness, diversity and equity within the development studies community

#### **ACTIVITIES**

In pursuit of these objectives, the DSA has achieved the following during the Financial Year 2025-2026:

##### **1. Annual Conference**

The 2025 Annual Conference was held as a hybrid event, offering both in-person and online attendance. It was organised and hosted by the University of Bath, 25-27th June 2025. Key statistics being Participants: 625; Papers/presentations: 420; Plenaries: 3; Panels, Roundtables and Workshops: 73.

Planning for the next annual conference began in July 2025 and it was agreed, further to positive evaluation results, that a three-day event would be hosted by University College Dublin in early July 2026 once again in a hybrid format. The format worked well in 2025 with ~62% of delegates attending in-person and the remainder online. The hybrid format continues to enable high levels of inclusion amongst global South colleagues and reduces the event's carbon footprint.

##### **2. Communications**

The DSA Communications Officer, Rowena Harding, continues to work effectively and diligently in the role and once again has expanded and heightened DSA Communications via the website, social media and the DSA monthly newsletter with greater followers and traffic in all of these sectors. The CO continues to coordinate with the Communications sub-committee on Council to ensure DSA communicates its activities and priorities in a variety of formats. The CO organised and curated further DSA webinars and has ensured better communication co-ordination between the DSA and its institutional, individual and student members.

##### **3. DSA Newsletter**

The DSA Newsletter is emailed out monthly to ~3000 individuals, offering an important service to members and the sector as a whole. It allows members to publicise events, publications, jobs and other news of interest to the sector. It is compiled by the Communications Officer from contributions from members and continues to attract interest as a means to reach the development sector worldwide.

##### **4. Study Groups**

Study Group activity remained strong in 2025, with all (except for four) groups active. These four groups have new convenors and have begun planning their activities for 2026. Study groups either held their own events during the year or convened a panel and/or meetings at the annual DSA conference. The following activities have been undertaken:

Politics and Political Economy Study Group held a three-day workshop in Dec 2025, funded by DSA + EADI. The event 'Is Development still possible' was attended by 60 participants. They also held a DSA/EADI Politics and Political Economy PhD Research group event on '(Re)-establishing political economy in development studies' and organised panels at the International Initiative for Promotion of Political Economy Conference in Ankara in September 2025 (2 panels on Industrial Development). No meeting of the SG took place at DSA2025.

Urbanisation and Development Study Group organised a meeting and a panel at DSA2025. Convenors are exploring whether to recruit 1 or 2 other study group convenors, who can help them to take forward additional activities in 2026.

Digital Technologies, Data and Development Study Group organised a DSA2025 panel.

NGOs in Development Study Group organised a meeting at DSA2025 and a panel - P40: 'Third sector's responses to wars and conflict: solidarity, antiracism and decolonisation'. They also organised a panel at GDI Students for Palestine conference, Oct 2025. The SG have been featured in Natil's edited volume Civil Society and Local Ownership in the Global South: Responses to Conflict and Militarism.

DSA Scotland held a one-day workshop in Glasgow, Sep 2025, with funding from DSA.

Religions & Development Study Group organised a DSA2025 roundtable workshop R10: 'Arts-based methods for religions and development research'.

Political Economy of Land, Labour and Food Study Group continued their webinar series throughout the year. One convenor, Mihika, was co-convenor of the DSA2025 conference at Bath.

Gender and Development Study Group co-organised the Gender Conference at the School of Global Development, UEA in June 2025 with support from the DSA.

Multidimensional Poverty and Poverty Dynamics held a hybrid meeting and organised a panel at DSA2025.

The Environment, Natural Resources and Climate Change Study Group held a meeting and organised a panel at DSA2025, they are currently working on an edited book out of this.

Rising Powers, Global South, Business and Development and Decolonising Development Study Groups recruited new convenors during 2025 and so did not have activity but are formulating plans for 2026.

### **5. Students**

At financial year-end student member numbers increased again over the year to 289 (23% of total membership) – this is the highest total number of student members in the past 10 years.

The two student reps on Council have continued to liaise with the selected student/ ECR reps from several of the DSA institutional members (IM reps). They have held regular online meetings to discuss how most students could benefit from the DSA and to plan events for students. They have an active mailing list among these reps for better communications. They have also engaged with some DSA Study Groups to showcase their work to ECRs and student members. The CO assists with student communication via the website, a new LinkedIn group and the Student Reps email list.

Prior to the annual conference, a group including the Council student reps and some IM student reps organised and held a policy impact workshop with significant assistance from the DSA CO. This was well attended and they plan to create similar events in future years. There was also a DSA students' meeting at the annual conference for the new student reps to meet in person and student members to find out more about the DSA. There was also, once again, a well-attended Publication Strategies briefing for students and early career researchers (ECR) at the conference, as well as the PhD Masterclasses just before the conference for 16 students.

The DSA continues to offer its annual Masters' level dissertation and PhD thesis prizes. The award winners were announced and presented their prizes at the annual conference in 2025 and the winners presented their work at the conference. The winning dissertations were mentioned on and linked to from the DSA website.

In late 2025, a new Student/ ECR Fund was created by the DSA to provide financial support for activities organised by students and/or Early Career Researchers (ECRs) that directly assist DSA student and ECR members.

#### **6. Heads of Centres**

A Heads of Centres meeting was held online on 13 November 2025. An update on DSA activities was given and liaison with the DSA Communications Officer. The focus of the meeting was a round-up of DSA activities and a presentation of the EDI Audit carried out by members of DSA Council.

#### **7. DSA webinars**

The DSA hosted several webinars during this reporting period. ‘What next for a broken aid system?’ took place at the start of April 2025 and ‘UK aid: where do we go from here?’ ran at the end of the same month. They were attended by 276 and 264 people online respectively and with a further 477 and 238 watching on YouTube. A webinar, ‘Getting published in journals: tips for first-time authors’ was held in October as a follow up to the conference, with more than 400 registrants.

#### **8. Publications**

The DSA-OUP book series published two new titles during this year: Taxing for Development by Matt Barlow & The Invisible Hand(out), by Samuel Brazys. The DSA-OUP book series editors were not able to hold their usual annual event at the DSA2025 conference to advertise the book series and encourage DSA members and attendees to propose their research as book titles. The CO has reached out to authors to deepen engagement and communication which has proved successful.

#### **9. DSA-EDI Audit**

The DSA has an ongoing commitment to advancing equality, diversity and inclusion (EDI) across the discipline. As part of this, it applied for and received funding from the Academy of Social Sciences (AcSS) and the Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC) to understand and address the specific barriers facing racially minoritised early career researchers (ECRs) in Development Studies and related fields. The Council sub-committee with the assistance of a recruited research assistant completed the project and finalised the report in 2025/26. As part of the project, they organised and held seven workshops around the UK for racially minoritised ECRs, which were very well received and provided valuable data for the final report. The results were shared with the HoCs during the November meeting, as well as to the DSA membership via the DSA newsletter and website. A report, video, audio recording and summary was produced.

#### **10. Decolonising Development Database**

Since its launch in 2024, the the database has expanded to include over fifty colleagues with expertise on different aspects of decolonisation as it pertains to the study of development. Those interested, or engaged, in decolonising development anywhere in the world can join and interact with one another to find expertise on decolonisation. The aim is for an active and engaged database rather than a large number of members. DSA and Council members are sharing information about the existence of the database, so colleagues can be pointed to existing expertise and support. The vision for the Directory is that it will facilitate the establishment of longer-term pedagogical and research dialogues in addition to mentoring relationships.

#### **11. JDS Special Issue**

During 2025, via discussions and negotiations between the Journal of Development Studies and the DSA Council, it was agreed that there will be a JDS Special Issue arising out of the DSA conference each year. Papers from the 2026 Dublin Conference will form the first Special Issue. An internal committee (comprising of members from council as well as conference scientific committee) will review submissions after the annual conference each year and select 8 papers to be published in the special issue.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

##### **Membership**

Individual membership at year-end was 1249, with over 50% being global South (gS) members - 682 (fee waiver category). The student membership category was up on 2024 numbers, while individual and concessions stayed steady. One small institutional member was lost during the year.

##### **Finances**

With sufficient reserves, the DSA continues to seek to allocate its reserves towards its central purposes: cash at bank increased from £153,741 to £202,200 on 31st January 2026.

Expenditure was slightly lower than budgeted in some areas (Council and HoCs meetings predominantly online; Study Groups claimed less than budgeted but more than the previous year. Conference grants provided by DSA were fully utilised this year. The EDI Workshops and Audit work used up the external funding received in 2024. The student fund was only created this year and so has not incurred spending yet. Income was higher than predicted due to another refund of an overpayment to GDI in 2020/21 for the salary of the DSA Communications Manager, additionally individual membership fees were slightly higher than predicted. The conference made a slight deficit due to late VAT charges from the University of Bath.

The DSA Communications Officer Grade 6, 0.6 FTE moved to a freelance contract to fit with the DSA being an unincorporated charity. The CO continues their work enabling the DSA to achieve its strategic objectives, particularly in advancing connections to deepen understanding of development, raising the profile of the UK development studies community and providing a platform for its collective voice and increasing our institutional strength.

##### **Administration**

The administration of the DSA continues to be carried out by NomadIT, on a rolling contract.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

##### **AIMS FOR THE COMING YEAR (2026-27)**

##### **Governing document**

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

##### **Recruitment, appointment, induction and training of new trustees**

Trustees are recruited from members of the DSA with upcoming vacancies signalled in communications to all members from the Chair of the Board. Applicants present their credentials and intentions to the AGM in person or by letter and their appointment is subject to vote. Induction and training takes place before applicants make their approach through informal discussions with existing board members and/or after their appointment. Positions with specific responsibilities (Chair, Treasurer, Secretary) involve more prior training and preparation.

#### **STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT**

##### **Risk management**

The DSA Council reviews sources of, and responses to, risks at least annually. Sources of risk include fluctuating membership, conference attendance, level of study group activity and the status of development studies in the UK. Risks are mitigated through regular consultation with institutional members through Heads of Centres' meetings, monthly newsletters and email communication, reviewing membership categories and rates, reviewing the purpose and design of annual conferences and reviewing costs involved in administering the charity.

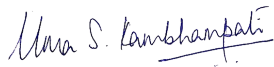

**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**Basis of preparing the financial statements**

Section 133 of the Charities Act 2011 permits a charity to prepare a receipts and payments account and a statement of assets and liabilities where gross income in the financial year does not exceed £250,000, therefore receipts and payments accounts and a statement of assets and liabilities in its balance sheet) have been prepared and presented for the year; this is consistent with previous years.

**Income**

All income, including the subscriptions, conference income and bank interest are recorded when received.

**Expenditure**

All expenditure are recorded when paid.

**Trustees' expenses**

These expenses are included in the financial statements once amounts are expended by the Trustees on behalf of the charity.

**Trustees' indemnity insurance**

No charitable funds have been used to purchase insurance to indemnify the Trustees against the consequences of any neglect or default on their part.

**Taxation**

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

**Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

**Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits**

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
